MC Parks Ordinance Language


Sec. 2-24-3. - Park property.

(1) *In general.* The following provisions apply to all county parks, including parking, office and related support areas:

.....

(c) *No holes on beach.*

1. No person shall possess on or about the sandy gulf beach a metal shovel of the type customarily sold in hardware stores (not a children's toy) unless part of a construction project permitted under the Florida Building Code or similar law.
2. No person shall dig a hole in the sandy Gulf beach deeper than one (1) foot below surrounding grade unless part of a construction project permitted under the Florida Building Code or similar law.

KEEP THE BEACH SAFE FOR SEA TURTLES

Here's how you can help

No Deep Holes

Deep holes pose risks to sea turtles and beach safety. Please avoid digging holes deeper than one foot deep. If you see a hole left behind, help us out by filling it in.



Leave the Shovel at Home

Small plastic shovels and sand play toys are fine, but metal shovels are not allowed on the beach.



Respect Wildlife

Keep an eye out for sea turtle nests and bird habitats. Avoid disturbing them and let nature thrive.



Leave No Trace

When you leave, please remove any sandcastles and fill in any holes you dig. This ensures a safe and enjoyable beach for everyone.



Lights Out

Keep lights off the beach after dark. Hatchlings use the light of the moon and stars to find their way and can become disoriented by artificial light.
